



Climate Change Adaptation Regional Exchange and CTI-CFF CCA Technical Working Group Meeting

May 15-17, 2024 Jakarta, Indonesia

I. Rationale

SuFiA TS and CTI-CFF entered into a partnership agreement in 2022 for SuFiA TS to provide technical support for building capacities as requested by CTI-CFF.

This Program Description is prepared in response to the CTI-CFF Regional Secretariat's request to support the implementation of activities under the SOM-18 approved 2024 Climate Change Adaptation Working Group (CCA WG) roadmap. The CTI-CFF Regional Secretariat plans to conduct a Regional Exchange to include the 2nd CCA Executive Course back-to-back with the 7th CCA WG meeting. The chair of the CCA WG is the government of Indonesia and is co-chaired by Timor-Leste.

SuFiA TS has been requested to partly support the planning and conduct of the Regional Exchange in the hosting of the 2nd CCA Executive Course and overall support for the 7th CCA WG Meeting. SuFiA TS 2024 Annual Work Plan identified this activity under its Strategic Approach 3 to provide technical support services to regional partners.

The 2nd CCA Executive Course is the follow-up to a previous course designed for local leaders conducted by the USAID SuFiA Local Capacity Development (SuFiA LCD) in 2022. The 2nd CCA Executive Course is aimed to benefit middle managers, officers, and technical staff of government agencies. Per the SOM-18 approved CCA 2024 Roadmap, SuFiA TS will be able to support two other activities by combining them into the Course - (a) how to conduct climate change vulnerability assessments in support of the CTI-CFF Regional Plan of Action 2.0 (RPOA2.0) – Target Output B3.1.1; and (b) update and disseminate CCA action plans for each of the CT6 and facilitate the development of a regional climate risk management plan, in support of the RPOA2.0 – Target Output B3.1.2². The Course looks at climate change projections in the CT region; understanding resiliency and vulnerability; how to conduct vulnerability assessment; looking at case studies; benchmarking for local implementation and monitoring & evaluation; and a communication session on communicating climate change management.

In the course, SuFiA TS shall also conduct capacity building on gender equality and social inclusion (GESI) to ensure that CCA experts and implementers will be equipped to incorporate issues surrounding GESI from the perspective of climate change. This is to address RPOA2.0 indicator for Target Output B3.1.2 that climate change action plans shall not only be guided by current projections and technology but also guided by CTI-CFF Gender Equality and Social Inclusion Policy (GESI Policy) and disseminated within the region. This will also contribute to SuFiA TS Indicator 10 in terms of training people to advance outcomes consistent with gender equality or female empowerment through their roles in public or private sector institutions or organizations.

¹ Target Output B3.1.1: By 2025, Exposure and vulnerability levels including projections on climate change risks are established and reported through the mid-term report in the CT Region.

² Target Output B3.1.2: By 2025, relevant existing climate change adaptation action plans are updated, guided by current climate change projections and technology, and disseminated within the CT region (also as guided by the CTI-CFF Gender Equality Policy).

The Regional Fisheries Climate Risk Management Planning workshop will also be conducted as part of the regional exchange to identify measures and opportunities to address and reduce climate change risk. Findings from the assessment conducted by SuFiA TS on "Climate Risk and Resilience: Reimagining Small-Scale Fisheries in Southeast Asia" will be shared and used as a reference for the workshop.

Technical resource persons identified by SuFiA TS and CTI-CFF will deliver the sessions, with the two CTI-CORAL Climate Adaptation and Resilience Fellows, Ms. Novena Rena Parengkuan and Ms. Zeldalyn Hilly providing facilitation support and technical assistance. Ms. Margot Stiles, SuFiA TS Regional Climate Risk Assessment and Management Specialist will facilitate the Regional Fisheries Climate Risk Management Planning workshop.

The CTI-CORAL Fellows shall also facilitate a session as part of the process to develop a draft policy recommendation on gendered climate vulnerability and risk management of subregional seascapes that can be integrated into future CTI CCA plans.

The participants in this event will include members of the CTI-CFF Regional Secretariat, CT6 National Coordinating Committee members, Climate Change Adaptation Working Group Chair and CT6 members, development partners, and representatives from the Women Leaders' Forum, Small-Scale Fishers' Hub/ SEAFish, and the Youth Ambassadors Program. In addition, SuFiA TS will support the participation of CCA Experts from the CT6 countries as resource persons and participants. This event will also contribute to SuFiA TS Result 4b on Increased Engagement and Influence of CSOs, Women, Small-Scale Fisheries, Youth and Marginalized Groups in Improving Fisheries Management through Regional Stakeholder Platforms.

2. Objectives

- 1) To organize a Regional Technical Exchange with capacity-building activities including the 2nd Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) Executive Course that includes sessions on:
 - a. Vulnerability assessment methods;
 - b. GESI approach to CCA;
 - c. Communication strategies for CCA; and
 - d. Climate risk management planning.
- 2) To co-support the conduct of the 7th Climate Change Adaptation Technical Working Group (CCA TWG) meeting.
- 3) To support the implementation of the approved CCA WG 2024 Roadmap to achieve two (2) 2025 target outputs conducted as part of the 2nd CCA Executive Course program, including
 - a. Target Output B3.1.1 Climate Change Vulnerability Assessment for RPOA 2.0
 - b. Target Output B3.1.2 Regional Climate Risk Management Plan for RPOA 2.0

3. Expected Outputs and Impacts

- a. Workshop Facilitation Plan, Training session designs, and presentation materials for the CCA REX and capacity-building sessions.
- b. Presentation materials at the CCA Working Group meeting.
- c. SuFiA TS presentation on updates and progress of support to CTI CCA TWG (report 2024 and work plan 2025) for the CTI Regional Secretariat to finalize for SOM19.
- d. Draft Regional Climate Risk Management Plan.
- e. Draft policy recommendation on gendered climate vulnerability and risk management of subregional seascapes
- f. Draft Outline for a Communication, Education, and Public Awareness (CEPA) Strategy for CCA.
- g. Activity Report.
- h. Training Reports for CCA 2nd Executive Course and GESI Capacity Building

Expected Impacts

- a. CT6 members are equipped to contribute to CTI-CFF in achieving target output B3.1.1: By 2025, exposure and vulnerability levels including projections on climate change risks are established and reported through the mid-term report in the CT Region;
- b. CT6 members are equipped to contribute to CTI-CFF in achieving target output B3.1.2: By 2025, relevant existing climate change adaptation action plans will be updated, guided by current climate change projections and technology, and disseminated within the CT region.
- c. CT6 members are equipped to communicate effectively with local managers and leaders on shared regional climate risks and to support these actors in advancing climate change adaptation fully integrated with gender equity and social inclusion (GESI).
- d. CT6 members have mastered fundamental concepts of climate hazards, exposure, and vulnerability as a basis for developing appropriate and stronger policies, regulations, and governance to reduce exposure and enhance adaptive capacity in communities that are vulnerable to climate change.
- e. CT6 members have access to tools, technologies, and methods that can be used by middle managers, officers, and technical staff of government agencies to assess vulnerabilities to climate change, develop national action plans to provide management options to build resilience based on national circumstances and apply MEL to implementation of those action plans.
